As part of this process, the board is also evaluating the reuse/reconfiguration of the old highway garage. As you are aware from past communication, the roof on the old garage is in dire need of repairs as well as containing asbestos. More information will be provided on the town's website as it comes available.

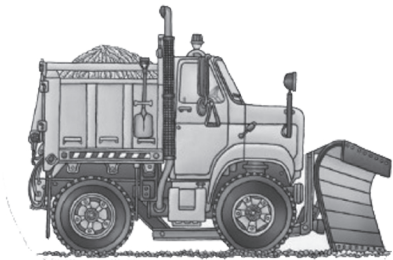

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT



The Highway Department hopes everyone is doing well after what was the oddest winter weather I remember in some time. As this newsletter comes out we hope the weather will be getting warmer and spring weather is

here with a great summer ahead. The Highway Department will be out as soon as possible when the weather permits to catch up on projects leftover from last year.

Spring cleanup will be starting as soon as the weather permits. The Highway Department will be out fixing plow damage, sweeping streets, picking up sand piles, picking up brush from the trees that came down in the last wet heavy snow we had. Pile brush up separately at the curb to be chipped. Leaves left from the fall months can be piled loose at the curb. **Spring clean-up material can be piled loose at the curb for this pick-up.** All other green waste collections throughout the year need to be in containers with brush piled separate for collection.

As many of the town residents may know, the Town Board and the Highway Department moved to a new Green Waste Collection Plan five years ago. The town purchased a used compactor truck for green waste collections and trash collections. We are finding that material for green waste is still being put out to the curb loose; **we will not be picking up this material in this manner after spring clean-up.** Green waste material should be put in reusable containers weighing no more than 50 lbs. each. Brush

should be piled separately with the butt ends facing the same direction to ease the pick-up by the highway crew for chipping. **PLEASE DO NOT PUT ANIMAL FECES IN YOUR GREEN WASTE - WE WON'T COLLECT IT.** NO GREEN WASTE OR TRASH SHALL BE PUT OUT UNTIL 48 HOURS BEFORE THE COLLECTION START DATE. WE WILL ASK YOU TO REMOVE IT FROM THE CURB. **Please mark the green waste dates on your calendar, as we won't come back until the next month after we have gone by.** Green Waste can always be brought to the Highway Garage anytime and put in the marked area.

The Highway Department will again this year have the Saturday trash collections at the Firehouse and at the Highway Garage. The first Saturday collection is on **April 21 at the Firehouse** on Trenton Road - please note this date. The other Saturday dates are **September 8** at the Firehouse and **October 20** at the Highway Garage. The Highway Department will also have curbside trash starting on **Monday, May 21 - once we have gone by your house, we won't be able to come back.** There are some new changes in the trash collection process; the town is no longer accepting electronic waste as trash from the curbside. We will accept electronic waste at the Highway Garage or at our Saturday drop-off sites for recycling. The Oneida Herkimer Solid Waste Authority will accept electronic waste at no charge on Leland Ave. in Utica. The dumpsters are available at the Highway Garage during our normal working hours, 6:00am to 4:30pm; please call ahead to schedule an appointment so we can have people available to help you.

The Town and the Highway Department have a very busy year planned. With the construction season shortened in 2017 due to the July rain and the repairs that followed, we will be catching up on planned projects from 2017. I am sure as you drive around town you will notice the freeze and thaw cycles have created a mess on roads everywhere. The Highway Department will be working on road projects and some normal road maintenance such as ditch cleaning and removing high shoulder buildup for better drainage. If any of the town residents have any drainage problems along the right of way, please call the Highway Garage at 826-7014. We will put you on our list and get to you as soon as possible.

In past newsletters, we talked about the sewer consent order from the DEC and the EPA to remove illicit water from the sewer system. The first program put into place was **Operation Ripple Effect** - how to remove illicit water from the sanitary sewer system. They are now on to a program called FOG - Fats, Oil and Grease inspection program best practices to keep grease out of the sanitary sewer system. The town had our entire system inspected by National Water Main Cleaning Company. They are

flushing and inspecting the sewer system for leaks and main problems. Now that the inspection process is done, the town has received a complete inspection report of about 48 miles of piping the town owns. The Highway Department will be starting to schedule some repairs to the system, in the very near future. The Highway Department will be working with the Codes Department asking for a voluntary inspection of your sewer hook-ups at your residence; this should be a very short visit. If there are any questions, please call the Highway Department at 826-7014.

FROM THE OFFICE OF BUILDING & CODES

IMPORTANT REMINDERS FOR THE COMING BUILDING SEASON

Inspections: With the building season gearing up, please remember that inspections **MUST** be made at certain phases of your construction. These inspections phases will be provided with your Building Permit. The Town of Deerfield Rules and Regulations for the Administration and Enforcement of the Building Code makes the OWNER, APPLICANT, OR HIS/HER CONTRACTOR responsible for informing the Code Office when work is ready for inspection and to schedule such inspections. These Regulations do not allow a CERTIFICATE OF OCCUPANCY (CO) OR COMPLIANCE CERTIFICATE (CC) to be issued unless the necessary inspections have occurred. THEREFORE, IF THE INSPECTIONS ON YOUR PERMIT ARE NOT PERFORMED, NO C.O OR C.C. WILL BE ISSUED FOR YOUR PROJECT.

Swimming Pools: We are already getting pool applications in for the spring installs. Please note that many residents bought inflatable pools last year. These pools have the same safety rules and regulations as other above /inground pools, so please call us before purchasing any inflatable pools this year. More importantly, local laws regarding fencing and other safety requirements for swimming pools may be more restrictive than requirements for swimming pools contained in the Uniform Code. If you are considering the purchase of a swimming pool, you should review the Uniform Code provisions which can be obtained at the Building & Codes Office. In addition, you should consult the building inspector on the local laws, ordinances, codes and regulations for any further requirements before purchasing a pool. Along with the permit, you will also need to call us for your final inspection before using your pool. At that time we will process your certificate of compliance and return your deposit for the electrical inspection report.

Decks: As a building inspector, I see a lot of decks that aren't built to code — despite the plan review process, the purpose of which is to identify any code issues before construction commences. But field changes are common, so an inspector is likely to find a different deck constructed at the site than what was detailed on the permit.

For many specifications, like those for spans and guardrails, you have to apply general code requirements.

Consequently, a deck contractor may not be aware that certain changes could result in a code violation. Below are five common reasons decks fail inspection.

- 1. No Protection against Decay:** It's a simple issue, usually noted on the plans, but we sometimes find a completed deck built of standard-grade lumber. Or portions of the deck built with standard grade lumber.
- 2. Too Few or Inadequate Fasteners:** We often find insufficient attachment — which includes the use of non-weather-resistant and/or non-structural fasteners attached to the existing structure, which can cause decks to collapse. Fastener specifications aren't usually called out on the construction plans, and inspectors often find undersized nails, or untreated nails that will be nothing but rust in a year or the fastener just shears off do to the weight of the loads imposed.
- 3. Inadequate or Non-approved Structure:** The IRC (Section and Table R502.5 (1)) no longer allows 4x4s or 6x6s to be used as girders (Figure 4). All structural beams and girders must be constructed with multiple 2x4s to 2x12s, with the depth and the number of layers of the members determined by the span and spacing.
- 4. Insufficient Support and Anchoring:** Whether attached to the existing structure or freestanding, all decks are required to be anchored against uplift and braced laterally to prevent racking and to prevent the deck from becoming a projectile in high winds.
- 5. Missing or Noncompliant Guardrails and Handrails:** Many owners don't want a guardrail to affect the view from their deck. They want something not too tall and often ask for benches or planters to act as guards. Note: that handrails are not guardrails, although the terms are often thought of at the same time. Per section R311.5.6, a handrail is required when there are four or more risers in the stair run and when the stair is more than 30 inches above grade or above the floor below, a guard is also required.

Fleas, Ticks, and Internal Parasites in Your Pets

Flea season spans from April through December in the Upstate New York area. Fleas are not only a cause of skin irritation and allergies but can also be the cause internal parasites. If your pet is exposed to fleas they will likely show signs of skin irritation most commonly on the back and base of the tail. This irritation causes your pet to scratch and potentially break open the skin. When the skin breaks there is a higher chance of infection. Another common factor of fleas around your pet are internal parasites known as tapeworms. Tapeworms are spread most commonly when your pet ingests a flea. The flea then deposits the tapeworm into your pets stomach and it continues to grow. Tapeworms are segmented worms that look similar to maggots. They can grow up to one foot in length while inside an animals intestinal tract. Tapeworms can cause weight loss and other dangerous health risks for your pets

Ticks are most prevalent form March through May and August through November. Ticks are well known in the pet community for being the cause of Lyme disease. However, did you know they can also cause Rocky Mountain spotted fever, Ehrlichiosis, and tick paralysis? Rocky Mountain spotted fever is a bacteria that acts like a virus inside of your pet's cells. It can cause loss of coordination, lethargy, irregular heart beat and other symptoms. Ehrlichiosis is a bacteria that attacks your pet's white blood cells. It can be present in your pet for months or years without showing symptoms. Symptoms include weakness, lack of appetite, and difficulty breathing. Tick paralysis is caused by a toxin in the saliva of some female ticks. This toxin affects the nervous system in pets causing paralysis of muscles.

It is important for your pets health that you take preventative measures against fleas, ticks and other parasites. There are many products on the market like, flea collars, chewable treats and topical serum, to prevent your pets from getting fleas, ticks, and internal parasites. Talk to your veterinarian about specific treatment plans that will work best for your pets.

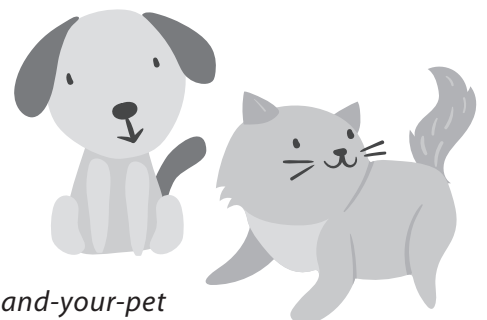

PEDDLERS AND TRANSIENT MERCHANTS

With the World the way it is today, we must work together to protect our neighborhoods. One way that our Town tries to do that is by a law enacted in 1996 local Law No. 2 regulating transient merchants and peddlers. The Law was amended in 2009 strengthening the requirement that all merchants and peddlers selling wares in the Town of Deerfield MUST obtain a peddler license issued through the Town Clerk's office.



The application must be filled out and accompanied by a photo ID. On this application they need to list their name and address plus the name and address of the company they are representing, we have them list the car & license plate number of the Car they will be using.

Licenses issued by the Town will have picture ID copied onto it. Always ask to see the peddler's license and picture ID. If the peddler cannot show a valid peddler license, you should not allow them to remain on your premises or enter your home.

You can contact the Town Clerk's Office 315 724-0413 ext. 223 to verify the issuance of a valid peddler's license. You may also contact the State Police or OC Sheriff Dept at 315 736-8364.

Twenty Years Ago

It was 1998 and quite a year it was. Two centuries of history, plus years of planning, resulted in a tremendous celebration of all things Deerfield. The Deerfield Bicentennial Committee organized a thoughtful program than spanned the entire year, creating a certain nostalgia that was reminiscent of the United States bicentennial in 1976.

From celebrating the first Deerfield bicentennial baby in January to officially setting the time capsule on its 50 year mission to the future, there were many events for the citizens of Deerfield. How many of these activities do you remember or participated in?

March 28-Deerfield students, along with town officials, hosted a dramatization of moments in local history, held at the Whitesboro Middle School.

April 18-A Bicentennial Dinner Dance was held at the Harts Hill Inn. Special guests included Bill Worden of WKTV and Oneida County Historian Joe Kelly. Music was provided by the No Name Band.

May 1 to 3-Land of the Oneida Council Boy Scout encampment was held, including a parade of over 1000 Scouts, an Eagle Scout reunion, story-telling, awards, campfire, and record setting Fire Bucket Brigade.

June 20-Bicentennial Golf Tournament held at the Eagles Club

July 12-Bicentennial Ecumenical Service held at the North Gage Presbyterian Church

August 2, 9-Deerfield Community Band hosted two concerts at the Wilderness Park

August 15 to 16-Deerfield Bicentennial Fair Days Weekend, featuring: a pancake breakfast, booths and crafts, exhibits, square and line dancing, various demonstrations from local groups, a Bicentennial parade featuring many floats, a memorial service, civil war re-enactment, Cleft Dwellers, Dixieland Band, COS Country Western Band, Boonville Sympathy

Band, Strolling Barbershop Quartet, Deerfield Community Band, a magician, sporting events, a postal stamp cancellation, dunk tank, fireworks, and much more.

August 21-Deer Trek III, a 10K run held at the Wilderness Park

October 3-Time Capsule ceremony held at the Municipal Building

Also, highlighting the year were various official proclamations, the unveiling of the Deerfield Bicentennial quilt, which is currently on display at the Municipal Building, Music in the Park, and the release of our town book "Deerfield, New York: A Glimpse into the Past" by Virginia C. Loin.

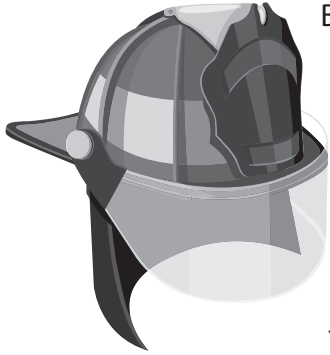
