Season's Greetings

Another year has flown by as we close out 2017. I would like to thank the residents of the town for their calls throughout the year as well as their patience during the year as we struggled at times to complete a variety of jobs in the town based upon the weather. The old saying "the best laid plans of mice and men often go astray" seems to be a never ending story when Mother Nature is involved.

We were fortunate to be awarded a \$50,000 capital construction grant through Senator Griffo's office that the town board allocated to redoing the municipal building parking lot as well as putting in lights around the parking lot for better visibility and security, particularly on court nights. Many thanks to the Senator for working with and for the Town of Deerfield.

As many of you have seen in the area of Glass Factory Road and Trenton Road, the State Department of Transportation has created a temporary contaminated soil site. While we hosted information sessions to try and deter their actions, we were not successful. The DOT owns the site and filed and received all the appropriate permits from all agencies, including the DEC. We will be monitoring it closely to ensure that the site is operated the way it is supposed to per the operating regulations.

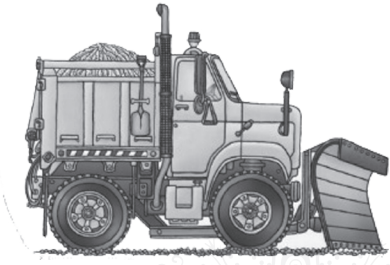
The Town Board is currently exploring options, including design and funding for a salt storage facility located at our highway garage located on Route 8. In the very near future, the DEC will be passing regulations (law) mandating all salt/sand piles must be covered. We are hopeful that this additional mandate by the state will be accompanied with some funding assistance. As part of the overall project, the board is also exploring what to do with the old highway garage. The old garage has a damaged roof but we are proceeding cautiously due to the roof containing asbestos. More information to come.

In closing, take time to enjoy the resources the town offers including the Wilderness trails. We will begin grooming them so bring the family and enjoy.

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT



The Highway Department hopes everyone has a great holiday season and everyone is in good health. With winter starting out early this year, the Highway Department would like to remind everyone to please drive with caution;

road temperatures are varying and can cause slick spots on the road. As the snow piles up, the Highway Department has a few reminders for everyone. Please keep cars off the street during overnight hours. This helps the Highway Department clear the streets more efficiently. In May 2009, our town adopted local law # 1-2009 which states that parked or abandoned vehicles on any public highways in the Town of Deerfield during snow storms, floods, fires, or other public emergencies can be removed at the owner's expense. **PLEASE DO NOT PUSH SNOW ACROSS THE ROADWAY.** This could cause an accident, and the person pushing the snow in the road could be held liable. With winter weather just starting out, keep in mind the tires on your car. All season tires are not the best tires in snow and ice; snow tires work the best in the winter months. Please keep trash cans clear of the curb so the plow won't knock them over.

When winter snow banks start to get higher, our children like to play in them and dig tunnels. Please remind them how dangerous this can be, as the plow drivers can't see them and we would not want to see anyone get hurt.

We hope everyone had a fun filled summer and enjoyed the short

but nice summer weather we had. The Highway Department had a very busy road construction season planned but was cut short with the rain storm in July. When the 2017 summer construction season came to a close, the highway department still had some small things to finish up on a few of our large projects. When the winter snow melts we will be out to finish the things we could not get to before the snow came. The Highway Department is planning another busy year in 2018. We will be splitting the construction season between maintenance and construction projects.

The Highway Department's trash collection site at the firehouse and the Highway Garage have worked out and has been well attended. We are going to continue having Saturday drop off times in 2018. Trash can be brought to the Town Highway Garage during our normal work hours; just call ahead so we can have someone there to help you load items into the dumpster. The Highway Department business hours are M-F 7:00AM to 3:30 PM. **Please do not drop off trash items after hours.** Green waste can also be brought to the Highway Garage any time and can be put in the designated area.

A number of years ago, the DEC and the EPA put out a sewer repair consent order because of the overflow problems during wet weather conditions. The Town of Deerfield and other towns are under this order. We have been attending meetings for some time. Things we are working on are **Sanitary Sewer Construction Standards** and ways to remove illicit water from the system. The town will have to



inspect the complete sewer system and make repairs as needed. Oneida County Sanitary sewer has come out with a program called **OPERATION RIPPLE EFFECT**. This is information for the homeowner on how they can help remove water from the sewer system and what to look for. As you have read in past newsletters we have had the complete sanitary sewer system inspected and the reports are back. The town is going to have to make some repairs we will be assessing the problems and prioritizing our repairs.

During the holiday season your kitchen never gets a rest. But food messes can have more consequences than just the time it takes to clean them up. Fats, oils and grease, also known as FOG, are used in or are byproducts of certain foods (cooking oil, meat fats, butter, salad dressing, mayonnaise and more). When warm or hot FOG may not seem like a big problem. However, after traveling down a sewer drain FOG cools and becomes solid, resulting in clogged pipes that can cause backups into your home or your neighbor's home. FOG also decreases capacity in the Oneida County sewer system, contributing to overflows at the Mohawk River.

So how much FOG is OK to go down the drain, Very little. In

fact, the maximum concentration allowed by the Oneida County Sewer use ordinance is equivalent to one teaspoon of vegetable oil in 12-13 gallons of water. So what do you do with the rest? Carefully pour warm not hot FOG into jars, cans and / or other containers. Once cooled, dispose of the container in the trash, or drop it off at the Oneida – Herkimer Solid Waste Authority's Utica residential convenience station on Leland Ave. in Utica during normal business hours.

FROM THE ASSESSOR'S OFFICE

Dear Residents,

Exemptions for the upcoming year will be due in the Assessor's office by March 1, 2018.

If you currently receive an exemption, you will receive a form around January 1st except of Basis Star

Which NO renewal is needed.

ENHANCED STAR EXEMPTION

To qualify one of the owners must be 65 years of age by December 31, 2018 and your 2016 Federal Adjusted Income form 1040 shown on line 37 minus line 15b must be less than \$86,000. Complete the form and return it with a copy of page 1 of your 2016 Federal Income Tax, to the Assessor's office.

SENIOR EXEMPTION

This exemption gives tax relief for School, Tow, and County taxes for those 65 years of age and over by March 1, 2018. The net amount of income for this exemption is \$15,000 and the amount must include income for all owners. The income figure must include all Social Security benefits, pensions and all income from Stocks, bonds, bank interest and W-2 income for the Year 2017. Complete the form and sent it along with copies of ALL income statements (1099) to the Assessor's office.

BASIC STAR

This exemption is available to all occupied residences. The income limit is our annual income must be less than \$500,000. Any residents who has purchased there residence after 2016 can only apply for this exemption with the NYS Tax Dept. contact the NYS Tax at www.tax.ny.gov/star/ or Property owners without access to a computer can register by phone weekdays from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. (518-457-2036).

Applications may be obtained and or filled out during the week form 10am till 3pm with the Town Clerk.

TAX COLLECTOR

Town and County tax bills are mailed out by the 1st of January by the Deerfield Town Clerk. If you no longer carry a mortgage on your home and pay your taxes directly, or do not have your taxes paid to an escrow account, and do not receive a bill in the mail, you can go to the Town's website: townofdeerfield.org, and follow the links to the 2018 Town and County tax bills, and print out a copy. You can also view your tax bill online at <http://egov.basgov.com/deerfield/>.

During the month of January you can pay your taxes either by mail or at the Municipal Building located at 6329 Walker Road, Monday thru Friday 9am to 2:30pm. Taxes may also be paid at the Deerfield Firehouse, Trenton Road, on Saturday, January 27th from 10am to 2pm. Payment is due in full, no partial payments accepted and must be paid or postmarked by January 31st, 2018 without penalty.

Taxes paid from February 1st through March 31st, add applicable penalties. Taxes paid after March 31st must be paid at the Oneida County Finance Department, which is located at the Oneida County Office Building, 800 Park Avenue, Utica, NY 13501. Taxes paid during the months of February and March can be paid at the Municipal Building on Monday, Wednesday & Fridays 9am to 2:30pm or by mail. Please be aware that on February 8th, 9th and 12th, I will be out of the office and taxes cannot be paid.

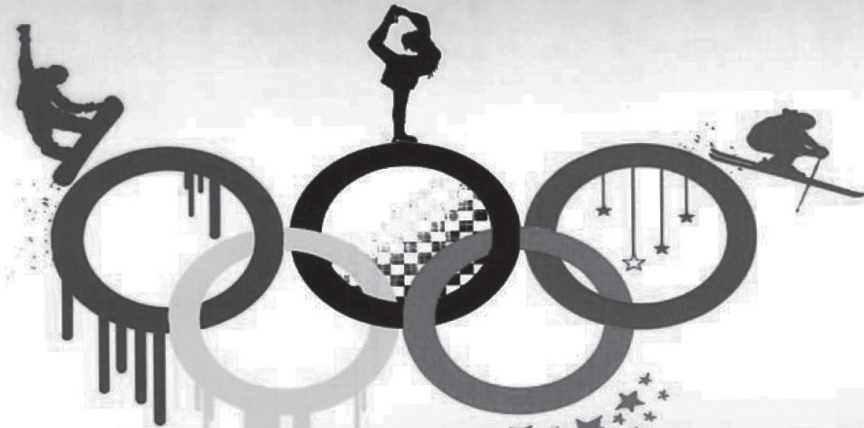

Whitesboro Central School District's Kindergarten Registration for the 2018-2019 school year will be held one day only on the following date at Deerfield Elementary School:

**WEDNESDAY, JANUARY 24, 2018
9AM-1:30PM AND 2-5:30PM
(WEATHER CONTINGENCY DATE: JANUARY 31)**

To be eligible to enter kindergarten in September 2018, a child must be 5 years of age **on or before December 1, 2018** and must reside in the Whitesboro Central School District. You must bring: proof of age (birth certificate); and proof of residency: including *three (3)* of the following: National Grid, telephone bill, current NYS driver's license, oil/propane delivery bill, cable bill, insurance bill, and/or paystub. Immunization records must be presented at the time of registration. **If you have a child who will be eligible to enter Kindergarten in September 2017, or know of someone who has a child who will be eligible, please call Deerfield School at 266-3412 for a registration packet to be mailed out to you in January.**

Deerfield, How it All Began

In 2018, the Town of Deerfield will be 220 years old. The story leading up to its day of incorporation is one that spans several decades, but involves royalty, adventure, hardship, endurance, and a resolve to persevere in a new land and country as well.

Deerfield, New York was once considered the "far frontier." It is comprised of two large swaths of land: Cosby Manor (22,000 acres) and Gage's Patent (18,000 acres).

In 1725, Nicholas Ecker received permission from Governor Burnet of New York to enter into agreements with the native people to purchase the lands on the North and South sides of the Mohawk River, west of Little Falls. Part of this land eventually became known as Cosby Manor.

Cosby Manor received its name after New York Governor William Cosby. Governors were not allowed to grant land to themselves. So in 1734, Governor Cosby devised a plan to obtain land for himself by granting land to friends and relatives, who in turn six days later, granted the land back to him. In 1735, Governor Cosby willed the land to his son Henry and wife Grace. They were required to pay 2 shillings and 6 pence to the crown each year for the land. However, Governor Cosby's widow did not keep up with the payments, and in 1772 it was seized by the sheriff of Albany County. The land was later divided and sold for 15 cents per acre.

Gage's Patent was granted to General Thomas Gage of the British Army in 1769 by King George III as a reward for his service during the French and Indian War.

The first settlers arrived in the spring of 1773 and settled on the northern side of old channel of the Mohawk River. They were Mark Damuth, Christian Realle, and George J. Weaver. They cleared the wilderness land for cultivation for two years before the outbreak of the American Revolution. Due to flooding, they had to move their homes northward to the area of Deerfield corners.



In the summer of 1776, an Oneida Indian named Blue Back, who was a friend of the early settlers, alerted them to a pending attack by the Indians and Tories. The early settlers had time to escape to a place in Schuyler named Little Stone Arabia. The Tories eventually found the settlement and burned all of the homes to the ground and ruined their crops. It was destroyed.

Mark Damuth later returned to his prior home in Herkimer and became a captain in the Rangers. He was wounded in an attack. George J. Weaver was taken prisoner near Herkimer and was transported to Canada, then to England. Nearly three years later, he was exchanged for one of Burgoyne's soldiers at the end of the American Revolution.

After seven years, all three families returned to Deerfield to rebuild their old settlement. Eventually more settlers arrived in the area, and a new community began to grow.

On March 15, 1798 both the Town of Deerfield and the County of Oneida were organized by an act of the State Legislature. It was carved from Herkimer County, which prior to that was part of Montgomery and Tryon Counties. The first town meeting was held at the home of Ezra Payne near Doyle Road, and the first town supervisor was Dr. Francis Guiteau.

Deerfield, New York was most likely named after Deerfield, Massachusetts. Many of the early settlers came from that state as they moved westward.

Deerfield Volunteer Fire Department News

Approximately one year ago, the Deerfield Fire Department began moving forward with a project to obtain a piece of equipment that would increase our capabilities to include off road rescue, forest fire fighting, and snowmobile rescue. For several years prior, we had participated in a shared services agreement with the Town of Deerfield to use their UTV on an as needed basis. During that time, it proved to be an invaluable asset. Then, the opportunity arose to purchase the UTV ourselves and put it into service at our station as a first response emergency vehicle.

The first step was the purchase of the used UTV from the Town of Deerfield. It was in good condition, well maintained and would suit our future needs. We were then able to arrange the donation of a used utility trailer that was subsequently completely refurbished by our members. The commissioners of the Deerfield Fire District No. 1 agreed to purchase a slide in firefighting skid unit equipped with a 70-gallon water tank, gas pump, hose reel, patient transport rack and equipment storage. The final addition was the purchase of a set of snow tracks that will be installed during the winter months.

Aside from making the UTV a well-equipped and usable emergency vehicle, our main priority was to complete the project with minimal impact to the tax payers of the Deerfield Fire District. Besides the donations, acquisition of the used UTV and many volunteer man hours, several groups contributed financially to the project. We would like to thank and recognize all involved. The Deerfield Skeleton Run committee contributed and benefits from having the UTV on standby at their event for EMS purposes. The Deerfield Fire Company covered much of the remaining cost with funds that came directly from your support of our many fundraising events including our Fish Frys and Field Days. Grants were pursued from several sources and one was awarded from the Walmart Community Grant Program. Finally, we would also like to recognize

the Deerfield Snow Trails snowmobile club for their support of this project and for their long history of assisting us through lending their invaluable expertise to our training program and allowing us access to their trail system.

We are proud to announce that the UTV is now fully in service and ready for response from Station 1 on Trenton Rd. It was used this past brush fire season several times where it quickly proved its worth and now sits ready to respond for the upcoming snowmobile season. While we always hope that we never must use our equipment and training, we do stand ready to respond when and where we are needed. Thank you again to all those that helped make this project happen.
