Season's Greetings

Another year has flown by as we close out 2018. I would like to thank the residents of the town for their support throughout the year. One of the most challenging and frustrating parts of managing the towns resources is the ever increasing regulations imposed by the state and the associated mandated costs that come with it. One of those changes is noted below in the need to erect a salt/sand storage facility.

The Town Board is currently finalizing plans for a salt/sand storage facility at our highway garage to be in compliance with new DEC regulation. In addition to the salt/sand storage facility, we will be tearing down the old highway garage and erecting an approximately 2,200 square foot metal pole building addition to the existing metal pole building. This will allow for the "cold" storage of equipment currently housed in the old highway garage. We are hopeful to go out to bid in the next two months with a spring construction schedule.

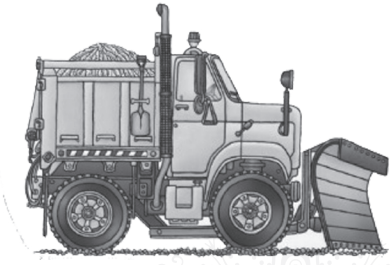
During 2019, the Town Board working very closely with our highway department will be developing a plan to correct the storm water runoff and drainage on Crossaint Circle. This project will be both very costly and require coordination with multiple agencies as well as homeowners. As part of this process, we will be exploring grant opportunities to offset the cost.

In closing, take time to enjoy the resources the town offers including the Wilderness trails. We will begin grooming them so bring the family and enjoy.

A MESSAGE FROM YOUR HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT



The Highway Department hopes everyone has a great holiday season and everyone is in good health. With winter starting out early this year, the Highway Department would like to remind everyone to please drive with caution; road temperatures are varying and

can cause slick spots on the road. As the snow piles up, the Highway Department has a few reminders for everyone. Please keep cars off the street during overnight hours. This helps the Highway Department clear the streets more efficiently. In May 2009, our town adopted local law # 1-2009 which states that parked or abandoned vehicles on any public highways in the Town of Deerfield during snow storms, floods, fires, or other public emergencies can be removed at the owner's expense. **PLEASE DO NOT PUSH SNOW ACROSS THE ROADWAY.** This could cause an accident, and the person pushing the snow in the road could be held liable. With winter weather just starting out, keep in mind the tires on your car. All season tires are not the best tires in snow and ice; snow tires work the best in the winter months. Please keep trash cans clear of the curb so the plow won't knock them over.

When winter snow banks start to get higher, our children like to play in them and dig tunnels. Please remind them how dangerous this can be, as the plow drivers can't see them and we would not want to see any of our children get hurt.

We hope everyone had a fun filled summer and enjoyed the nice summer weather we had this year. The Highway Department

had a very ambitious road construction season planned but was cut slightly short with the spring clean-up starting late and taking extra amount of time. The highway department started late getting the roads pre-paired for paving work. In working with the paving companies we all struggled to get our paving projects scheduled in 2018. When the 2018 summer construction season came to a close, the highway department still had projects to get to and things to finish. When the winter snow melts we will be out to finish the things we could not get to before the snow came. The Highway Department is planning another busy year in 2019. We will be splitting the construction season between maintenance and construction projects. As winter started vary early this year we did our best to get the leaves picked up. We were around town twice with the leaf vacuum but all the leaves had not fallen yet. After the snow fell on them it was very hard process collecting them we will be around in the spring to get any we missed.

The Highway Department's trash collection site at the firehouse and the Highway Garage have worked out and has been well attended. We are going to continue having Saturday drop off times in 2019. Trash can be brought to the Town Highway Garage during our normal work hours throughout the year; just call ahead so we can have someone there to help you load items into the dumpster. The Highway Department business hours are M-F 7:00AM to 3:30 PM. **Please do not drop off trash items after hours.** Green waste can also be brought to the Highway Garage any time and can be put in the designated area.

A number of years ago, the DEC and the EPA put out a sewer repair consent order because of the overflow problems during

wet weather conditions. The Town of Deerfield and other towns are under this order. We have been attending meetings for some time. Things we are working on are **Sanitary Sewer Construction Standards** and ways to remove illicit water from the system. The town will have to inspect the complete sewer system and make repairs as needed. Oneida County Sanitary sewer has come out with a program called **OPERATION RIPPLE EFFECT**. This is information for the homeowner on how they can help remove water from the sewer system and what to look for. As you have read in past newsletters we have had the complete sanitary sewer system inspected and the reports are back. The town is going to have to make some repairs we will be assessing the problems and prioritizing our repairs.

During the holiday season your kitchen never gets a rest. But food messes can

have more consequences than just the time it takes to clean them up. Fats, oils and grease, also known as FOG, are used in or are byproducts of certain foods (cooking oil, meat fats, butter, salad dressing, mayonnaise and more). When warm or hot FOG may not seem like a big problem. However, after traveling down a sewer drain FOG cools and becomes solid, resulting in clogged pipes that can cause backups into your home or your neighbor's home. FOG also decreases capacity in the Oneida County sewer system, contributing to overflows at the Mohawk River.

So how much FOG is OK to go down the drain, Very little. In fact, the maximum concentration allowed by the Oneida County Sewer use ordinance is equivalent to one teaspoon of vegetable oil in 12-13 gallons of water. So what do you do with the rest? Carefully pour warm not hot FOG into jars, cans and / or other containers.

Once cooled, dispose of the container in the trash, or drop it off at the Oneida – Herkimer Solid Waste Authority's Utica residential convenience station on Leland Ave. in Utica during normal business hours.

NEW YORK STATE DEPT. OF TAXATION ANNOUNCES STAR PROGRAM CHANGES

New York State Department of Taxation and Finance has announced changes to the 2019 STAR program.

Property owners age 65 and over need to be aware of the following changes:

In order to receive the Enhanced STAR exemption, you must enroll in the Income Verification Program (IVP). Enrollment only has to be done once and if you are eligible for the Enhanced STAR exemption, you will automatically receive it each year.

The IVP will ensure that individuals no longer meet renewal deadlines and will no longer have to provide income tax returns to their local assessor's office.

If you are already receiving the Enhanced STAR exemption and are already enrolled in the IVP, you do not need to take any action. The NYS Tax Department will contact you directly if any additional information is needed.

If you are already receiving the Enhanced STAR exemption and are not enrolled in the IVP, you must renew your application for the Enhanced STAR and enroll in the IVP.

In addition, individuals who qualify for the senior citizen exemption will no longer receive the Enhanced STAR exemption. You must apply for the Enhanced STAR exemption separately.

Individuals who are new homeowners or first time STAR applicants need to first register for the STAR credit with the NYS Tax Department instead of applying for the exemption. Additional information about the STAR credit can be obtained at **www.tax.ny.gov/STAR**. Or call **518-457-2036**.

FROM THE ASSESSOR'S OFFICE

Residents who currently receive the Enhanced exemption will receive form RP 425 RNW and RP 425 IVP. You must return both completed forms plus a copy of your 2017 Income by 3/1/2019.

The Assessor's hours beginning November 1st will be every Tuesday evening 5:30pm until 9pm.

TAX COLLECTOR

Town and County tax bills are mailed out by the 1st of January by the Town Clerk. If you no longer carry a mortgage on your home and pay your taxes directly, or do not have your taxes paid to an escrow account, and do not receive a bill in the mail, you can go to the Town's website: townofdeerfield.org, and follow the links to the 2019 Town and County tax bills, and print out a copy. You can also view your tax bill online at <http://egov.basgov.com/deerfield/>.

During the month of January you can pay your taxes either by mail or at the Municipal Building located at 6329 Walker Road, Monday through Friday 9am to 2:30pm. Payment is due in full, no partial payments are accepted and must be paid or postmarked by January 31st, 2019 without penalty. You can now use a debit or credit card to pay your taxes.

Taxes paid from February 1st through March 31st, add applicable penalties. Taxes paid after March 31st must

be paid at the Oneida County Finance Department, which is located at the Oneida County Office Building, 800 Park Avenue, Utica, NY 13501. Taxes paid during the months of February and March can be paid at the Municipal Building on Mondays, Wednesdays & Fridays 9am to 2:30pm or by mail.

A FIRE SAFETY MESSAGE FROM DEERFIELD CODE DEPARTMENT

Make the holiday season a happy time by practicing these safety habits. The holidays are a time to enjoy family and friends and reflect on those things that are the most important to each of us. There should be nothing more important than providing a safe and secure home for your family. By following these simple, but often overlooked, safety tips you will be well on your way to a safe and happy holiday season.

1. Christmas Trees

- **Artificial Trees** — When purchasing an artificial tree, look for one labeled "Fire Resistant." Although this label does not mean the tree won't catch fire, it does indicate the tree will resist burning and should extinguish quickly.
- **Selecting a Live Tree** — Needles on fresh trees should be green and hard to pull back from the branches. The needles should not break if the tree has been freshly cut. Old trees can be identified by bouncing the tree on the ground. If many needles fall off, the tree has been cut too long, has probably dried out and is a fire hazard.
- **Caring for your tree** — Do not place the tree close to a heat source, including a fireplace or heat vent. The heat will dry out the tree, causing it to be more easily ignited by heat, flame or sparks. Do not put your live tree up too early or leave it up for too long. Keep the tree stand filled with water at all times.
- **Disposing of the tree** — Never put tree branches or needles in a fireplace or wood burning stove. When the tree becomes dry, discard it promptly. The best way to dispose of your tree is to take it to a recycling center or having it hauled away by a community pick-up service.

2. Decorations

- Follow the manufacturer's instruction on how to use tree lights. Any string lights with worn, frayed or broken cords or loose bulb connections should not be used. Never use electric lights on a metal tree.
- Unplug Christmas tree lights before leaving home or going to sleep.
- Never use lit candles to decorate a tree.
- If you use candles to decorate a room, make sure they are in stable holders and placed them where they cannot be easily knocked over. Never leave a burning candle unattended.
- All holiday decorations should be nonflammable or flame-retardant and place away from heat vents.
- Never put wrapping paper in a fireplace, it can throw off dangerous sparks and produce intense flames that can cause a chimney fire.

3. Guests

- Keep your family and overnight guests safe with a working smoke alarm on every level of your home, in every bedroom, and in the halls adjacent to the bedrooms. Test smoke alarms monthly and replace batteries at least twice a year.
- Overnight guests should be instructed on the fire escape plan and designated meeting place for your home.

Winter With Pets

It's that time of year again with snow and freezing temperatures among us! Here is some information to keep your pets safe, happy, and healthy through the winter months.



Did you know a new law was passed in Deerfield regarding animal welfare? Similar to Adrian's Law, which passed in Syracuse last spring, this law provides limits to how long animals can be left outside in freezing temperatures. This law will now give law enforcement and animal control the ability to write tickets or even arrest offenders who leave pets outdoors in harsh conditions.

Animals are affected by winter weather conditions in several ways. Older animals with arthritis have a more difficult time with mobility in cold temperatures. Be sure to provide your older pet with a clear path outside to prevent slips and falls. Animals with diabetes, heart disease, kidney disease and other health conditions have a harder time regulating their body temperature, and may be more susceptible to problems from temperature extremes.

It is a common misconception that animals are more resistant than people to cold temperatures because of their fur. This is untrue. Although some long haired animals are more fit for winter weather, no pet should be left outside for long periods of time in extreme conditions. Animals of all breeds are susceptible to frostbite and hypothermia. Short haired breeds may need an extra layer of protection (coats, sweaters, boots etc.) while outdoors during cold weather. Animals who are outside for longer periods should be provided with a well insulated windproof shelter, food, and water that is not frozen. The floor of the shelter should be raised off the ground to prevent heat loss into the ground. It is important to change the bedding regularly to ensure it is dry and warm.

Be sure to wipe down your dogs paws frequently during walks. Salt and other deicing chemicals are harmful to dogs paws and internal organs. Wiping down their paws will not only prevent against surface issues like cuts and burns, but will also prevent the risk of poisoning if they lick their paws. Also, consider buying pet friendly deicers for your property.

As always you know your pet the best, so pay attention to the signs it is giving you. Shivering, shaking, immobility and other behaviors are indications that your pet is cold. Knowing your pets limits is the best way to prevent issues during these cold months.

A Snapshot of Deerfield in 1894

On October 2, 1894, the Utica Weekly Herald published an in-depth article entitled Deerfield, Something About the Town's Past and Present. Here are some of the highlights, which also encompassed the many humble beginnings of our town:

The Waterways and Terrain

In 1894, the Town of Deerfield was bordered by the West Canada Creek to the north and the Mohawk River to south. Other waterways included Reall's Creek and Crooked Brook, which was referred to as a "good sized stream" in the northern part of town. There was also mention of Nine Mile Creek as well.

Deerfield was known for its varied terrain. Alluvial flat lands were present in the vicinity of the Mohawk River. Heading northward, one would encounter a gradual, then steady ascent up the hills of Deerfield. Beyond the hills, was a steep descent into a valley region, followed by yet another climb through the upper part of town. That area to the north boasted a very fertile, rich, dark loam soil, whereas the middle part of Deerfield hosted slate close to the surface.

Valuation

Excluding the 190 acres previously annexed to the City of Utica with a valuation of \$60,000, the town's remaining 22,350 acres had an overall equalized valuation of approximately \$708,000.

Population

The population of Deerfield was 1,954 at the time of the last census in 1890.

Churches

There were a total of seven churches throughout the town: one Baptist, one Episcopal, one Roman Catholic, two Union, one Calvinistic M.E., and one Union church not in use.

The Two "Villages"

While neither was ever incorporated, both North Gage and Deerfield Corners were referred to as villages. Both areas of town were highly prominent and well-known throughout the country.

Schools, Roads, and Mail Service

The Town of Deerfield was home to twelve school districts and twelve (one-room) school houses, the first of which was a log cabin built in 1807. There were 41 road districts throughout the town. In 1894, the only remnant of the old plank-style roads was noticeable on a small, wet section of Walker Road. Tollgates were still present in town. Deerfield had two post offices, one located in North Gage and one located at Deerfield Corners.

Agriculture, Farming, and Industry

Dairying was the principal industry in town, including the presence of five cheese factories. Top crops included hay, corn, and potatoes. Oat and fruit crops were minimal in 1894. Wild carrots were invasive to fields within the town.

Other industries located throughout Deerfield included multiple saw mills, brick-making, a tannery, shoe shop, paper and novelty company, paper box factory, three general stores, a barber, three blacksmith shops, a harness shop, two saloons, four hotels, a grange, and a physician. North Gage hosted a chapter of the Patrons of Industry, and was home to a large village hall, which had recently been doubled in size.

An Interesting Tidbit from 1872

On August 1, 1872, the Daily Observer included the following while reporting on President Ulysses S. Grant's visit to the area:

"A bright little girl gave the President a little bouquet, and a man from North Gage brought him a large loaf filled with gooseberries and blackberries. This singular gift was handed to the gentlemen in the rear of the shakers, and we believe that is the last the President saw of it."
